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Conceptual background



- Number of people on the move? 1 bill on the move and 200 mill international migrants
- Aging-in-Place → Aging-between-Places (<u>Cutchin, 2003</u>, and <u>Johansson, Laliberte-Rudman, Mondaca, Park, Luborsky, Josephsson, & Asaba, 2012</u>).
- Importance of the everyday Everyday life occupies essentially all our time, yet it is conceptually often equated with the mundane, unimportant, or impotent (Binnie, Holloway, Millington, and Young, 2007)

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Method



 Ethnographic approach to interviewing and participant observation over time with a small group of informants (Mattingly, 2003), followed by a participatory approach referred to as photovoice (Wang & Burris, 1994).

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
Method - What is Photovoice

- Photovoice is grounded in issues or relevance identified by participants, aiming to achieve practical action-oriented outcomes (Wang & Burris, 1994).
- "a process by which people can identify, represent, and enhance their community through specific photographic technique" (Wang, Cash, & Powers, 2000, p. 82).
- Enables participants:
 - $\boldsymbol{\rightarrow}$ a) to record and reflect strengths and hinders in their communities,
 - → b) engage in critical dialogue about important topics through group discussions of photographs, and
 - → c) to play an active role in reaching the public and policymakers. All phases of participatory research are carried out in collaboration with researchers, community partners, and participant stakeholders

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Findings from project



- Negotiation of places
 - Participants described feelings of ambiguity around having two homes in the world being between countries and yet being of both
- Making connections
 - → Although the shared experience of migration was often brought up as important in forging relations and connections with others, language and particular symbols were often at the heart of stories
- Family
 - Participants in this study described the relevance of family in facilitating or hindering a sense of being able to participate fully in ones community
- Navigating through social structures
 - → Participants in this study described in different ways the importance of getting in contact and understand the rules, institutions and practices of the host country
