Do the following legal provisions constitute a measure having equivalent effect to quantitative restrictions?

- 1. Motorcycles Italian law allows the import of trailers which are specially designed to be towed by motorcycles but prohibits trailers to be towed by motorcycles.
- 2. Confectionery Austrian law prohibits the sale of non-packaged confectionery from vending machines.
- 3. Optic lenses Hungarian law prohibits the sale of optic lenses over the internet due to the lack of qualified advice.
- 4. Tobacco Spanish law prohibits retailers from importing tobacco products but forces them to procure their supplies from authorised wholesalers.
- 2. Austrian law case

a) No discrimination

because it's not a measure which treats products coming from other Member States.

b) Hindering

this measure restricts the trade between the Member States. It's a product related measure and it is forbidden.

Result: It is a measure having an equivalent effect.

2. Justifiable

- the consumer could not see the ingredient, experation date
- Unhygienic, public health
- 3. Is the restriction adequate?
 - yes it is adequate but...
- 4. Is the restriction necessary?
 - no, because the government could find less strict measures e.g. labeling outside of the machine

Result: It is a forbidden measure.

3. Optic lense case

- a) No discrimination, see above
- b) Hindering
 - yes, this measure restricts the trade between the Member States.

Result: It is a measure having an equivalent effect.

2. Justifiable

- because of the lack of qualified advice the government's purpose is to protect the people.

3. Is the restriction adequate?

- yes, because if the Hungarian could not offer qualified advice it could be a problem for the health of the people who use optical lenses. Basically you should go regularly to an optician to check the lenses.
